### I. Picture Books For the Youngest (K-3)

\*\*Adler, David. The Number on My Grandfather's Arm. Photos by Rose Eichenbaum. UAHC (Union of American Hebrew Congregations).

The large clear photos and simple, direct language make this publication a moving introduction to the Holocaust.

Caseley, Judith. Apple Pie and Onions. Greenwillow Books.

A charming story of Rebecca and her Yiddishspeaking grandma, and the love and embarrassment she feels for her.

Cohen, Barbara. *Even Higher.* Illus. by Anatoly Ivanov. Lothrop, Lee & Shepard.

A popular story by I. L. Peretz is ably retold with bright, colorful illustrations.

Cooks, Roberta Goldshlag. *Gittel and the Bell.* Illus. by Susan Martz. Kar-Ben Copies.

Impish Gittel's desire to ring the village bell gets her into trouble with the elders of her shtetl.

DePaola, Tomie. *Queen Esther.* Harper & Row. Beautifully and simply told with bright simple pictures by the noted author-illustrator.

Rosenblum, Richard. My Sister's Wedding. Morrow.

Marrying a soldier—what could be more exciting! The author's charming sketches draw the young reader into the simple story of his sister's wartime wedding in 1943.

# II. Books For Young Readers (Grades 3-6)

Chaikin, Miriam. *Esther.* Illus. by Vera Rosenberry. Jewish Publication Society.

A finely crafted book with delicate line drawings.

Chaikin, Miriam. *Exodus*. Illus. by Charles Mikolaycak. Holiday House.

Gloriously illustrated in full color with a poetic and complex text.

Chaikin, Miriam. Yossi Tries to Help God. Illus. by Denise Saldutti. Harper & Row.

The third delightful book about Yossi.

Citrin, Paul J. Joseph's Wardrobe. Illus. by Lindsey Aitken. UAHC.

This collection of five midrashim, set within a tale of marriage and intrigue in King Solomon's court, should appeal to those who love adventure stories.

Cohen, Barbara. *The Christmas Revolution*. Lothrop, Lee & Shepard.

An excellent, enjoyable, and much-needed book in which all "December issues" are raised.

Cohen, Barbara. First Fast. Illus. by Martin Lemelman. UAHC.

A meaningful story of ten-year-old Harry's first Yom Kippur fast.

Kuskin, Karla. *Jerusalem, Shining Still.* Woodcuts by David Frampton. Harper & Row.

Appealing to adults and children, the handsome tinted woodcuts and serious poetic words outline the history of Jerusalem from the time of King David until today.

Schnur, Steven. *The Return of Morris Schumsky.* Illus. by Victor Lazzaro. UAHC.

Delightful, irrepressible Morris Schumsky adds a few unexpected guests to his granddaughter's wedding and provides a meaningful twist to a special day.

Wikler, Madeline; Groner, Judyth. *Miracle Meals: Eight Nights of Food 'n Fun for Chanukah*. Illus. by Chari Radin. Kar-Ben Copies. Lots of fun and food in this new cookbook.

Krantz, Hazel. Daughter of My People: Henrietta Szold and Hadassah. Lodestar Books.

Three new titles from Lodestar's Jewish Biography Series; short but thorough biographies of important Jewish figures.

Kushner, Lawrence. *The Book of Miracles*. UAHC.

A carefully organized collection of midrashim, retold and enhanced with commentary by a leading theologian and masterful story-teller.

Shamir, Ilana, editor. The Young Reader's Encyclopedia of Jewish History. Viking-Kestrel.

An attractive, ambitious volume filled with beautiful and informative color photographs and useful maps.

Shteiner, Puah. Forever My Jerusalem. Feldheim.

This touching memoir of a young child's exile from Jerusalem, and her triumphant return as an adult in 1967, has garnered much praise.
