## New Judaic and Hebraic Journals, 1993–1995

Beis Moshiach = Bet Mashiah. No. 1–1993– Editors: Sholem Y. Chazan and M.M. Hendel. Beis Moshiach Inc., 327 Kingston Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11213–4329. Monthly. \$130 (\$90 within Crown Heights).

"Weekly publication for Anash and Tmimim" (subtitle). This popularly-oriented periodical reflects the beliefs of those within the Lubavitch movement who attribute Messianic status to the late Rebbe, Menachem Mendel Schneerson. The serial contains articles on the life and teachings of the late Rebbe, as well as articles on various aspects of Hasidic history and belief, and news about activities of the Lubavitch movement. All articles are in both English and Hebrew.

BINAH: Studies in Jewish History, Thought and Culture. Vol. 1– 1989– Praeger Publishers, 88 Post Road West, Westport, CT 06881. ISSN 1048–6054.

Monograph series published by The International Center for University Learning of Jewish Civilization (Jerusalem) and The

Open University of Israel. Each volume focuses on a particular topic in Jewish studies. "BINAH is dedicated to the presentation of current and classical Hebrew scholarship selected from Hebrew journals and festschriften"; articles are translated into English.

Volume 1 (1989): Studies in Jewish History; Volume 2 (1989): Studies in Jewish Thought; Volume 3 (1994): Jewish Intellectual History in the Middle Ages. All three volumes are edited by Joseph Dan.

Editor's note: A planned new serial with a similar purpose, entitled Judaica in Jerusalem, was announced in vol. 1, no. 1 (1983) of Judaica Librarianship (p. 42) but never appeared.
